

"Practicing an Art"



"Practicing an Art" was created by the Indianapolis Modern Quilt Guild for The Modern Quilt Guild's QuiltCon 2020 Charity Quilt Challenge.

Every year, this challenge is issued to local guilds with a theme and a color palette. The 2020 theme was text in a palette of gray-scale. From design through construction, this was a collaborative project involving 23 guild members.

The design process started with a desire to use Kurt Vonnegut's words to express our feelings about creativity. Once we found the perfect quote, we created a design showing Kurt "speaking" the words, using one of his signature self-portrait doodles.

The unique look of the quote was created by having individual quilters make a letter or two, with a few general guidelines. These letters were then combined into the quote. While the letters are consistent and complement each other, each individual letter is unique.

The quilt was pieced over several weekends by a committee, and then quilted on a long-arm quilting machine using a variety of motifs and incorporating the titles of Vonnegut's works. Finally, black binding was attached to frame the entire quilt.

In February 2020, the quilt hung at QuiltCon 2020, in Austin, Texas, along with charity quilts made by local guilds from all over the world.

The finished project was donated to the Kurt Vonnegut Museum and Library and currently hangs in Downtown Indianapolis as part of their permanent exhibit. For more information on the museum, please visit: www.vonnegutlibrary.org/.
